Following every branch assembly, governance members are inducted into their roles and responsibilities and will work in their respective roles to provide opportunities towards National Society development and positive growth.

Branch Assembly is scheduled to take place in 2024. Each Branch Governing Board is composed of a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary/Treasurer and four members inclusive of a youth member from the Palau Red Cross Youth Council, and manages the strategic planning and decision-making on Branch activities.

The Chairperson of the North Branch Governing Board was nominated and elected in the 2023 General Assembly as Chairperson of the National Governing Board. Following the PRCS Constitution, if there is a vacancy in the position of the branch chairperson, the Vice Chairperson shall automatically assume the role.

1.2 Strengthen Auxiliary Role and Partnerships

- Develop and implement Memorandum of Understandings (MOUs) with key stakeholders; e.g., Ministry of Health and Human Services (MHHS), Ministry of Education (MOE), Civil Society Organizations (CSO).

PRCS has continued to build partnerships with key stakeholders both internally and externally. **Partnerships** with other agencies are significantly important to PRCS' mandate to serve the most vulnerable in our communities. While PRCS works as an auxiliary to the government, partner agencies assist in effectively identifying challenges in all aspects of life. Collaborative efforts contribute to identifying possible solutions and developing effective strategies to address the challenges faced and specific needs of those most vulnerable in our communities.

Partnership with Palau's 16 states through the National Emergency Management Office (NEMO) strengthens PRCS' auxiliary role by allowing community Red Cross Disaster Action Team (RDAT) trainings to take place in each state. The training objective is to prepare RDATs with knowledge, skills, and tools to respond to emergencies.

Memorandum of Understandings (MOU) with key stakeholders will be revisited in 2024, developed and put in place for implementation. An MOU with MHHS for Voluntary Non-Remunerated Blood Donation is among the first to be reviewed.

Key stakeholders representing Office of the Vice President of Palau, Ministry of Health and Human Services, Ministry of Education, Omekesang, and Palau Parents Empowered (Disability Program) play an important role in the General Assembly. The stakeholders are invited as observers and may also participate in discussions on key issues and the strategic goals of the National Society. The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent (IFRC) and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) also play an important role in this growth.

Governance members (National, North Branch, Central Branch) play an instrumental role in the growth of the National Society, and contributed to the success of the first-ever *Humanitarian Fundraising Ball* held on August 31, 2023. In 2024, work on **Humanitarian Advocacy and Diplomacy** will begin.

1.4 Improve Transparency and Accountability

- *Regularly update social media and the website to inform community members and develop mechanisms to receive feedback.*
- *Publish quarterly newsletters with news, updates, activities, donations, and members.*

The **FY 2022 Financial Audit Report** was completed by Burger, Comer, and Magliari (BCM) with Unmodified Opinion or “clean audit”; **Adopted by the PRCS National Governing Board on June 06, 2024; Resolution #01; Series 2024.** The audit report is available on the PRCS website at www.palauredcross.org.



1.5 Ensure Financial Sustainability

Significantly increase current income sources and develop alternative revenue streams to cover PRCS annual service delivery plans and core costs.

- *Expand on payroll allotments and online recurring payments - recruitment and retention to increase by 5% annually*
- *Expand on key revenue streams and reflect them in the Annual Plan and Budget of PRCS, i.e. fundraising activities.*
- *Continue to actively seek domestic and international grant opportunities; and to strengthen and expand on partners' support - Public Private Partnership.*

There is a noted decrease in the number of payroll allotments / bi-weekly allotters in 2023 as a result of increased outmigration and the challenges of global inflation. There were **292 allotters in 2023 compared to 348 allotters in 2022.** Recruitment efforts are on-going at every opportunity during outreach activities, partner events, and mass gatherings. Online donations (PayPal) through the PRCS website has become operational and is a convenient avenue to welcome income from tech savvy donors and supporters inside and outside Palau.

The **first-ever Humanitarian Fundraising Ball** held on August 31, 2023 was a success. The event was hosted by the PRCS Chief Patron, the President of the Republic of Palau. With partnership support of the Health Care Coalition, the Humanitarian Ball is an approved event to happen every year as part of National Disaster Preparedness Month (September) activities.

PRCS is continuing to find opportunities to improve and enhance efforts for its income generating activities. Plans are being developed to revamp **Commercial First Aid & CPR Trainings; General Membership Fees; recruitment and retention activities for Individual and Corporate Donations; Donation Boxes; and Annual Fundraisers.** A used clothing retail store is in planning to open in 2024 following the completion of the PRCS Emergency Relief Supplies Storage Warehouse and Training Center.

Commercial First Aid is one significant source of income for the National Society. The income generated through commercial first aid trainings are included with donations received from PRCS annual general membership; individual donors through payroll allotments, walk-ins, PayPal donors; corporate donors; donation boxes; and fundraising events. The funds are used in times of emergencies, and help support PRCS' core activities such as providing basic lifeline assistances through the Single Incident Emergency Assistance Program to households affected by disaster and health related incidents.

In 2023, households affected by house fire, climate change (flooding; landslides); and domestic violence were provided assistance because of the efforts to ensure financial sustainability. PRCS is eternally grateful to all its donors - individuals, businesses, and agencies who have entrusted PRCS to be their First Aid and CPR training provider, or are giving in other ways helping to fuel the support provided to those most in need in the communities. 1.6 Capacitate Human Resources

(Staff, Members, Volunteers, Youth)

- Enhance volunteer management program.
- Institute volunteer engagement and retention activities i.e. recruitment, screening, training, engagement and support, and recognition.
- Organize and strengthen PRCS school and community Red Cross Youth Council to serve as platforms for youths to be volunteers and leaders.
- Enhance capacities of staff, members, volunteers, and youth through trainings and facilitated learning platforms.

Volunteers play a big role in the National Society. They provide the needed assistance that PRCS needs to deliver services to vulnerable people in communities. Throughout the years, volunteers are provided with meal and transportation allowances, and assist at the PRCS Headquarters in the fields of Administration, Finance, Disaster Management, Logistics, Health and Social Services, Information Management, and Dissemination and Communications. Every year on December 5th for **International Volunteers Day**, PRCS is given the opportunity to show its gratitude and celebrate the volunteers for the different support and talents they bring to the team.

Youth volunteers are governed by the **PRCS Youth Council (PRCYC)** of which are elected through a Youth Assembly. They are represented in the PRCS Governing Boards (National, North Branch, and Central Branch). **Youth Club Programs** to launch in 2024.

Training is on-going for community volunteers, the Red Cross Disaster Action Teams (RDATs) in Palau's 16 states. The **RDAT Trainings** aims to prepare community volunteers with knowledge, skills, and tools to respond to disaster and health emergencies. Partner agencies National Emergency Management Office (NEMO), National Weather Service, Ministry of Health and Human Services (MHHS), Ministry of Education, International Organization for Migration, and Governors of the 16 states have important roles in this effort. Policies, systems, and procedures are regularly being reviewed, updated, and developed as needed. They are disseminated appropriately for implementation.

PRCS acknowledges the support of relevant partner agencies and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) Head of North Pacific Sub-Office Mr. Kaustubh Kukde who worked together to review, update, and develop a roadmap to the **PRCS Strategic Plan 2023-2027**. The document has been finalized and published as of March 2023.

1.8 Improve External Communications and PRCS Positioning

- Actively promote PRCS and the RCRC Movement knowledge and awareness through community outreach activities, pamphlets, flyers, videos, radio/TV, social media platforms, newspaper, newsletter, and annual reporting showcasing available services and programs.
- Initiate or participate in national, international and global events or advocacies consistent with the Seven Fundamental Principles.
- Utilize PRCS Governance and Community Red Cross Disaster Action Teams for advocacy and information dissemination.

Community reach to **promote PRCS and the Red Cross and Red Crescent (RCRC) Movement** significantly improved in 2023 as the topics were included and consistently presented during RDAT trainings in Palau's 16 states. Promotional activities continues at every opportunity during field operations, partner agency meetings and events, and through PRCS quarterly newsletters and bi-weekly radio program.

Guided by the **Seven Fundamental Principles** of *Humanity, Impartiality, Neutrality, Independence, Voluntary Service, Unity,* and *Universality*; and with respect to inclusivity, PRCS also utilizes website, email, calls, SMS text, whatsapp, messenger, facebook, twitter, public bulletins, and word of mouth in its dissemination efforts to actively promote PRCS and the RCRC Movement.

PRCS Governance and Community RDATs play a big role in improving external communications and PRCS positioning as they are inducted into their roles. The governance will assist PRCS in reaching out to traditional and high level positions while RDATs will assist in information sharing within their respective communities.

1.9 Increase Logistics Capacity

- *Establish Emergency Relief Supplies Warehouse Facility.*
- *Increase capacity of Standard Emergency Relief Items.*
- *Maintain an effective stockholding plan.*

Establishment of the **PRCS Emergency Relief Supplies Warehouse and Training Center** is made possible through generous funding support from Japan’s Grant Assistance for Grassroots Human Security Projects (\$404,828USD), Embassy of the Republic of China (Taiwan) (\$42,386.83USD), and International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) (\$20,000USD).

PRCS worked with the Palau Public Lands Authority (PPLA) and Ministry of Public Infrastructure and Industries (MPII) for approval of a 6,000 square meter of public land in Ngebudel, Airai State. Approval was granted and lease agreement signed in 2020.

Due to critical pre-construction work, the expected completion date at end of 2023 has been pushed to June 2024.

PRCS has continued to utilize four existing container storage facilities to house Disaster Risk Management Standardized Relief Items (SRIs). The SRIs are continuously supported by the IFRC and are valuable for supporting people affected by disasters. A stockholding plan has been put in place for effective management of the SRIs. The 2023 inventory of SRIs is shown on Table 1.

1.10 Develop National Society Infrastructure

- *Establish National HQ Office.*
- *Develop Emergency Housing Capabilities.*

PRCS Governance and Management continues to oversee the construction of the Emergency Storage Warehouse and Training Center in Airai, and plans are still being developed for the establishment of **PRCS' National Headquarters**.

PRCS Management is working to establish partnerships to support development of **Emergency Housing Capabilities**. Current infrastructure supports the storage of NFI's and other relief items used in Single Incident Emergency and response.

STRATEGIC GOAL 2

ENHANCE COMMUNITY RESILIENCE

2.1 Improve Community Disaster Preparedness, Disaster Response, and Disaster Risk Reduction

- Strengthen RDAT capacity in every state with appropriate level of trainings, skills, and response equipment.
- Implement / support low-cost, low-tech community-based disaster preparedness and disaster risk reduction.
- Develop and implement low-cost, low-tech initiatives to address climate change mobilizing PRCS volunteers.
- Establish standard feedback mechanisms to update PRCS database.
- Support drafting and implementation of SOPs with state government and relevant agencies.
- Partner with relevant agencies to strengthen disaster management Single Incident Emergency response.

PRCS and partner agencies National Emergency Management Office (NEMO), National Weather Service, Ministry of Education (MOE), Ministry of Health and Human Services (MHHS), and International Organization for Migration (IOM) have continued to work together to support **Level 1 RDAT Trainings** in Palau's 16 states. The continuity of trainings is crucial to empowering and building the number of RDATs in each of the 16 states as government goes through changes during elections. The ultimate goal of the RDAT trainings is to empower and build capacity among community members by providing the necessary knowledge and tools to support and improve preparedness, response, and resilience to climate risks.

The number of community RDATs trained in 2023 from 12 out of 16 states are shown in Table 2. The four remaining states will be completed in 2024. They are the state of Ngatpang, Ngchesar, Peleliu, and Angaur.

PRCS databases are being managed by the Information Management (IM) Unit, but not all. The IM Unit is working with the management team to fully centralize storage and security of all PRCS databases. Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) will need to be developed to ensure a smooth transition and to specify data requests processes and required certification.

The **PRCS Single Incident Emergencies (SIE) Assistance Program** helps to alleviate human suffering to those affected by disaster and health related emergencies. In 2023, requests for SIE assistance received through the PRCS Disaster Management Unit confirms the consequences of climate change such as extensive rain, landslides, flooding, water scarcity, drought, and severe fires are causing extreme hardships in households throughout Palau's 16 states.

SIE assistances provided to households post-assessment varies depending on the urgency, level of damage, and total household population. The SIE assistances are made available through the compassion and generous support of partners and donors. It is through them that basic lifeline necessities such as water, food, and safe shelter can continue to be provided within 72 hours to those experiencing single incident emergencies.

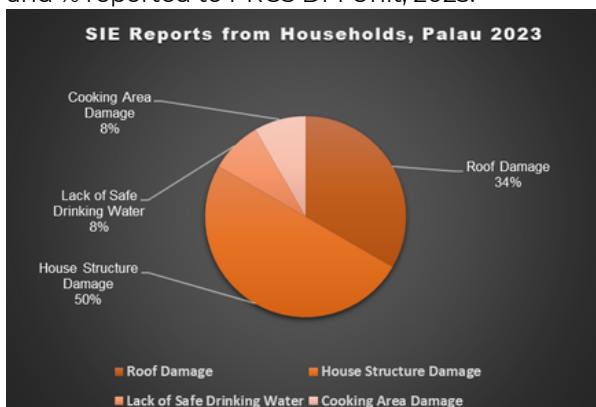
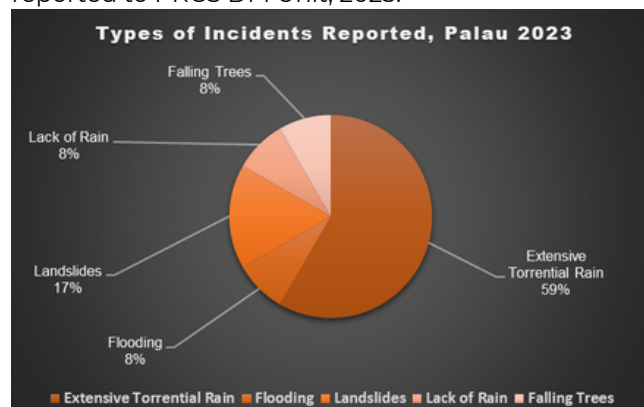


Figure 2: Types of Emergency Incidents and % reported to PRCS DM Unit, 2023.

Figure 1 shows descriptions of household (HH) emergencies and percentage reported to the PRCS Disaster Management (DM) Unit in 2023. Figure 2 shows the type of emergency incidents and percentage that caused HH damages reported in 2023. A total of 45 Households were assisted by PRCS from October 2022 to December 2023.

Figure 1: SIE Household Damage Descriptions and % reported to PRCS DM Unit, 2023.

2.2 Be the Primary First Aid/CPR Reference Center in Palau

- Establish a sustainable roadmap for providing community and commercial FA / CPR training in every state in Palau.
- Develop relationships with community health workers to promote health and safety.
- Organize regular First Aid groups and expand to schools.
- Implement Monitoring and Evaluation of CPR program.
- Conduct baseline survey for FA / CPR training.
- Have a First Aid certified volunteer in every state in Palau.
- Host FA / CPR (including water safety) Training of Trainers to increase number of available instructors.
- Develop PRCS Palauan First Aid Training curriculum and materials.
- Develop and implement Community First Aid Standby and Basic EMT Program with Partners.

First Aid and CPR Trainings is one of the primary services PRCS provides to the Republic of Palau and is an essential part of the 3-day RDAT training carried out in all 16 states. This effort has strengthened community partnerships and allowed PRCS to train more than a 100 community members throughout the Republic. Table 3 shows the number of Community First Aid and CPR Trainings for community members.

PRCS also provides First Aid and CPR Trainings as a service to local businesses. Table 4 details the agencies and number of persons PRCS has trained in 2023.

PRCS Health & Social Services (HSS) Unit launched First Aid and CPR Training-of-Trainers (TOT) and has conducted 2 trainings in 2023. The TOT participants need to complete a required minimum number of hours of supervised trainings in order to be certified instructors.

2.3 Conduct Community-Based Health and WASH Activities

- *Capacitate volunteers in each state to conduct community health promotion, community-based surveys, and health education activities to address relevant community issues such as NCDs, and disease outbreaks.*

RDATs in Palau’s 16 states are trained in **Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)** including Crisis and Emergency Risk Communication (CERC). They assist in health promotion and education on safe WASH during emergencies when conducting household initial damage assessments. During the COVID-19 Pandemic, they assisted with distribution of information, education, and communication materials (IECs), and continue to stand ready to support the HQ team when need arises for any emergency.

The annual celebration of National Disaster Preparedness Month (September) has been an opportunity to bring WASH promotion and education into the communities. In 2023, WASH activities were conducted in schools and with the elderly populations.

2.4 Promote Voluntary Non-Remunerated Blood Donation (VNRBD)

- Sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Ministry of Health and Human Services (MHHS) on voluntary non-remunerated blood donation (VNRBD).
- PRCS to manage blood and supply operation to collect and retain blood donors; utilize mobile van.

PRCS is working to review and update or develop MOUs with partner agencies, MHHS being one of them for VNRBD services. PRCS has continued to work with Belau National Hospital Laboratory to improve and enhance VNRBD services, including conducting blood drives and recruiting voluntary blood donors.

The top 10 blood donors of the year are recognized annually on World Blood Donor Day (June 14).

Table 5 shows the Top 10 Blood Donors of 2023 by Name, Gender, and Blood Group. Table 6 shows the number of Blood Drives conducted in 2023 by Date, Location, and Number of Blood Donors. Table 7 shows the Cumulative Total Number of Blood Units donated in 2023.

In order to continue to enjoy the confidence of all, the Movement may not take sides in hostilities or engage at any time in controversies of a political, racial, religious or ideological nature.

INDEPENDENCE

The Movement is independent. The National Societies, while auxiliaries in the humanitarian services of their governments and subject to the laws of their respective countries, must always maintain their autonomy so that they may be able at all times to act in accordance with the principles of the Movement.

VOLUNTARY SERVICE

It is a voluntary relief movement not prompted in any manner by desire for gain.

UNITY

There can be only one Red Cross or one Red Crescent Society in any one country. It must be open to all. It must carry on its humanitarian work throughout its territory.

UNIVERSALITY

The International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, in which all Societies have equal status and share equal responsibilities and duties in helping each other, is worldwide.

STRENGTHEN PALAU RED CROSS SOCIETY

- Governance members are inducted into their roles and responsibilities, and provided opportunities for development and growth in their respective roles.

- Develop and implement Memorandum of Understandings with key stakeholders; e.g., Ministry of Health & Human Services, Ministry of Education, Civil Society Organizations

[1.3] STRENGTHEN GOOD GOVERNANCE.

- Conduct regular PRCS General and Branch Assemblies.
- Governance members at all levels are inducted into their roles and responsibilities and provided opportunities for development and growth in their respective roles.
- Involve/seek support from governance members in all PRCS activities and programs.

GOAL 2:

- Strengthen RDAT capacity in every state with appropriate level of trainings, skills, and response equipment.
- Implement/support low cost, low-tech community-based disaster preparedness and disaster risk reduction.
- Develop and implement low-cost, low-tech initiatives to address climate change mobilizing PRCS volunteers.
- Establish standard feedback mechanism to update PRCS data base.
- Support drafting and implementation of SOPs with state government and relevant agencies.
- Partner with relevant agencies to strengthen disaster management Single Incident Emergency response.

[2.3] CONDUCT COMMUNITY-BASED HEALTH AND WASH ACTIVITIES.

- Capacitate volunteers in each state to conduct community health promotion, community-based surveys, and health education activities to address relevant community issues such as NCDs, and disease outbreaks.

[2.4] PROMOTE VOLUNTARY NON-REMUNERATED BLOOD DONATION.

- Sign a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Health & Human Services on voluntary non-remunerated blood donation.
- PRCS to manage blood and supply operation to collect and retain blood donors; utilize mobile van.

[2.5] PROMOTE PROTECTION, GENDER, AND INCLUSION.

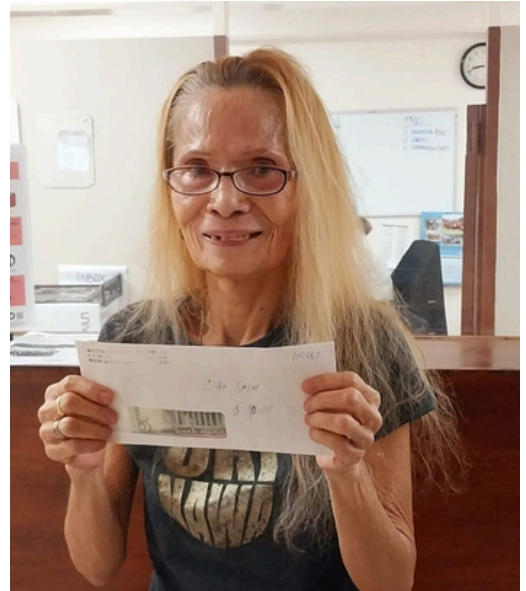
- Develop and implement socially inclusive initiatives involving seniors for healthy aging; persons with disabilities; LGBTQIA+ community.
